International One Design

Bringing the IOD World Championship Home

Northeast Harbor is set to host the International One-Design (IOD) World Championship from September 6 to 12, 2025. This prestigious sailing event will bring together top sailors from around the globe to compete in the iconic waters of Mount Desert Island.

The IOD class, renowned for its elegant design and competitive spirit, has a rich history in Northeast Harbor, In 1938, the local fleet received its initial batch of 14 boats, marking the beginning of a longstanding sailing tradition in the area. Today, the Northeast Harbor Fleet boasts nearly 30 IODs, making it one of the largest and most active fleets worldwide. These vessels, with their distinctive long overhangs and graceful sheers, are a familiar and cherished sight in the local waters.

The upcoming championship is expected to attract a diverse array of competitors from various IOD fleets, including those from Bermuda, Norway, Sweden, the United Kingdom, Canada, and several U.S. regions such as Fishers Island, Marblehead, Nantucket and Gibson Island. This convergence of international talent underscores the global appeal and camaraderie inherent in the IOD class. Northeast Harbor has previously demonstrated its capability to host such esteemed events, having organized the IOD World Championship many times, most recently in 2017. The area's unique sailing conditions, characterized by rolling fog, shifting winds, and the scenic backdrop of Maine's rugged coastline, offer both challenges and rewards for participating sailors.

The local community is eagerly anticipating the championship, viewing it as an opportunity to showcase the region's rich maritime heritage and hospitality. The event is expected to draw spectators and sailing enthusiasts, contributing to the vibrant atmosphere that surrounds competitive sailing in Northeast Harbor. One unique aspect of the IOD World Championship is that the visiting crews are hosted in the homes of the local community, and the event is looking for volunteers. History and Design

(IOD) is a single-design racing sailboat designed in 1936 by Bjarne Aas and Corny Shields. It's known for its classic lines and consistent performance, and while the original design is over 80 years old, it remains a popular choice for vintage racing and cruising. Modern IOD boats are built to the original specifications, with a focus on preserving the classic design while utilizing modern construction techniques.

WHAT GREAT NEWS!

"The Criterion is undergoing a transformative phase, with renovations and new leadership aiming to revive it as a cultural hub. Summer 2025 promises a vibrant lineup post-reopening!

The nonprofit board voted on April 13, 2025, to transfer the theater's assets to the Harper House Music Foundation, a new nonprofit led by longtime Bar Harbor summer residents Stephen and Allison Sullens. They pledged \$1 million for operations, programming, and preservation.

The theater is slated to reopen in June 2025 under this new partnership, with a focus on community-centered performing arts.

"In terms of the Criterion Theatre, we plan to build a legacy for the theater with its iconic value and fundamental role in the MDI community," said Allison Sullens. "I believe it's important to support the programming of the Criterion to create a space for artists to flourish and the community to access the arts." Future operationsHarper House Music Foundation hopes to open the Criterion's doors in early June. It plans to hire an executive director, with input from a cross-section of community members, to grow the theater's programming and staff while fundraising and expanding community outreach.

"Right now, we are just getting the dust out of the theater. Our immediate goals are to build a management team that has experience with running nonprofits and theaters to look at how we can realistically program and fundraise," explained Allison.

Local business owner Michael Boland led the restoration of the theatre in 2014, backed by a \$2 million gift from an anonymous donor. Boland returns as the Criterion's interim director, working alongside General Manager Beverley Guay to establish staffing and food and beverage operations.

"Michael brought this idea to us," said Allison. "He's been so generous with his time. We could never turn the lights back on without him."excerpt from Isabella Wellman-Webster (Mount Desert Islander)

Rooted in the belief that music is a vital and universal source of connection, joy, and meaning, Harper House Music Foundation (HHMF) seeks to be an agent of change by facilitating efforts that help artists share their work, lead stable and healthy lives, and preserve their unique legacies.



THE CRITERION 1932

Resplendent with Art Deco decor, and boasting a floating balcony. Ba state-of-the-art Graybar "Inter-Phone" system, and a basement "speakeasy," the Criterion Theater was a marvel of design and modernity in its time. It is one of two existent Art Deco theaters in Maine, and the only one that retains its original auditorium, without having been split or divided.

Roy G. Blake was hired in 1933 as Projectionist by George C. McKay, Sr. and the Criterion's first Manager, Richard Wellman. He had previously served as Projectionist at the Comique Theatre in Camden and the Star Theater in Bar Harbor (both silent film theaters). In the mid-1950's he served as Criterion's Manager, and was a member of the Bar Harbor Congregational Church.

Betty Jane "B.J." (Noyes) Morison and her husband Peter G. Morison bought the Criterion from George C. McKay, Sr.'s daughter, Dr. Marguerite McKay Dwyer and her husband Dr. Clement Story Dwyer in 1966, and maintained ownership until 2001. B.J. was known for her intolerance for tomfoolery in the theater, and would demand that people spit gum into her open palm while she collected tickets at the entrance! She and Peter regularly hosted the MDI Film Club at the theater, and welcomed the lifting of the Motion Picture Production Code, which was replaced by the MPAA Film Rating System in 1968.

The theatre was sold two more times between 2001 and 2014, first to private ownership and then to a nonprofit organization. Unfortunately, due to financial hardship, the theater was closed for some time towards the end of this iteration. Fortunately, in late 2014 one of the theatre's former owners, Michael Boland, rallied forces and organized a new nonprofit entity, bolstered by a generous \$2 Million donation from an anonymous donor. Work began immediately thereafter to restore the theater to its former glory, including repairing major structural issues, installing a digital projector, reupholstering the seats, matching the original carpet, wall panels, and sconces, re-painting the ceiling, and incorporating many other thoughtful details. The Criterion SUMAER EVENTS+



Bar Harbor's **Criterion Theatre** opened at 7 o'clock p.m. on Monday, **June 6th**, **1932**. The lavish opening night lasted from 7pm until after midnight, and drew nearly 2.000 people to two separate shows, each of which featured a speech by Julien Emery - chairman of the Board of Selectmen, live music by a seven-piece orchestra, vaudeville acts, and a screening of "Arsene Lupin," starring John & Lionel Barrymore, and Karen Morley. In the opening ceremony, a large basket of flowers was given to George & Ethel McKay, and congratulatory telegrams from stars such as Greta Garbo, John Gilbert, Joan Crawford, and John Barrymore were read aloud. Harry A. Smith, "well known in Portland and New York theatrical circles," was the director of the opening shows.

George C. McKay, Sr., founder of the Criterion Theatre, had previously served a one-year term at the Bangor jail beginning in August of 1923, sentenced by US District Court justice John Andrew Peters for violating the Volstead Act (for bootlegging). His friend Daniel Herlihy, the "Rum King" of early 1920's Bar Harbor, was sentenced to federal penitentiary in Atlanta, Georgia for a one-year term. Their indictments, along with that of Malvern Greenhouse owner John Stalford and several other bootleggers from the Southwest Harbor area were pursued by deputy customs collector Howe Higgins, District Attorney Frederick R. Dyer, and Maine Governor Percival Baxter, who promised to rid Maine of "the whole brood of liquor offenders" in his 1923 inauguration address.

For the record, it must be noted that Mr. McKay went on to become an upstanding citizen of Bar Harbor, as a member of St. Saviour's Episcopal Church, the MDI Lion's Club, and the Hayseeders. He and his wife, Ethel Thomas McKay, also served as gracious hosts for sundry local events at the Criterion, including those for the Civilian Conservation Corps (C.C.C.), the Relief Association (for Depression-era unemployed), the annual "Community Santa Claus Fund" drives, the March of Dimes, The American Legion (Post 25), Amateur Vaudeville Shows, Brownie Troop #17, and the Jackson Memorial Laboratory. by... FAMOUS FOOTSTEPS

VACATION RENTALS WITH A STORIED PAST

For more than a century, Mt. Desert Island has hosted celebrities, dignitaries, and even presidents on occasion, and for good reason! Even the rich and famous want to explore all the splendors Acadia National Park has to offer! Some of our favorite rental homes have seen notoriety within their walls, and so we thought it would be fun to share a brief look at a few of them!

OVEREDGE



THE BAYVIEW

This classic shingle-style home was built for Daniel Coyt Gilman, an early president of Johns Hopkins University and founder of Baltimore's Gilman School, He also advised Northeast Harbor on its high school curriculum, leading the village school to be named "The Gilman School" in his honor.





REDWOOD



This "grande dame" of estates on Bar Harbor's shores was built for Major George G. McMurtry, a Medal of Honor recipient who was one of **Teddy Roosevelt's "Rough** Riders" as well as a member of the "Lost Battalion" during World War I.



Built in the Queen Anne style, this historic estate in Bar Harbor was owned by the Auchincloss family and frequented by Jackie Kennedy Onassis as a child with her stepfather. Hugh Auchincloss.



SOL'S CLIFF



This survivor of the 1947 fire was originally built by Arthur Train, a noted New York attorney and crime writer, whose works were made into popular films in the 40s and 50s. For many years, a portrait of his father-in-law,



Benjamin Kissam, hung in the dining room and was reportedly painted in 1890 by none other than John Singer Sargent, yet remained unsigned. According to an Atlantic Monthly article written by Train, Sargent was attending a luncheon at Sol's Cliff in 1921 and admired the portrait forgetting that it was his own work, even after his host pointed out that he had painted it. Upon close examination, he recognized his unique technique of outlining a white handkerchief in green, a result of his astigmatism. Using Train's daughter's paint set, Sargent removed the painting from its frame and signed it on the spot, claiming, "A hundred years from now, there'll be a battle between experts as to the authenticity of this picture. They will be able to prove from the condition of the paint that, while the portrait was made in 1890 and is so dated, it was not signed until 1921. However, that needn't worry us now. Let 'em fight it out among themselves when the time comes!"

ELIOT COTTAGE

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The Time Is Now, Zero Energy Homes

A new Maine builder is providing high-performance homes to year-round Mainers.



3 bed/2 bath, 1-floor living @ 1,300 sq ft, by BrightBuilt Home for Zero Energy Homes

Zero Energy Homes is creating a new pathway to homeownership for Mainers priced out of the housing market, by combining "net zero energy" principals with state-of-the-art modular construction using 80% Maine and regionally sourced materials. This spring, Zero Energy Homes built its first home in Searsport, Maine, and it is now inviting interested buyers to express interest in ten additional homes it has planned. Each home will produce most or all of its own energy through a solar array, resulting in low or no heat and electric bills.

A resident of Mount Desert, **Caroline Pryor** - president & founder, turned her attention to manufacturing and bringing new forms of capital to tackle societal challenges after four decades working with conservation and other NGOs. She has made it Zero Energy Homes' company mission to sell sustainable homes to year-round households earning approximately 80-150% of their county's area median income, as defined by MaineHousing.

To build its first homes, Zero Energy Homes partners with Maker Construction, a builder in western Maine with modular and panelization expertise. The demonstration home in Searsport features a tight thermal envelope, 8.5"-thick walls, and primarily Maine-made building materials, including wood-fiber insulation by TimberHP, triple-glazed windows by Mathews Brothers, and pine clapboards, flooring, and trim. Maine suppliers are also providing cabinets, heat pumps, energy-efficient appliances, and solar panels. Its cape-style design was created by BrightBuilt Home, a Portlandbased design firm that specializes in modular, sustainable homes. In addition to panelizing ten homes in 2025-26, Zero Energy Homes will site and develop a modular home manufacturing facility, located in downeast between Belfast and Ellsworth, with anticipated production in the second half of 2026. It expects the facility will produce 50-60 homes per year within five years of operation. "It's an ambitious plan," says Pryor, "but the housing and climate crises demand bold new solutions."

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The Sabah Woods Neighborhood was a partnership project with a generous private landowner, who provided four acres for year-round homes affordable to people working on Mount Desert Island. Located in Bar Harbor, just off Route 3, this landowner had four modular homes built on four acres, which were then offered for sale to qualified working households. IHT qualified the applicants and holds the affordability covenants on the properties.

Island Housing Trust (IHT) promotes viable, year-round island communities by advancing permanent workforce housing on Mount Desert Island, Maine.

We strive to fulfill our mission in the following ways: Supporting efforts by public and private individuals and organizations to create housing that is affordable to the yearround working population of MDI.

Promoting and seeking to establish public and private partnerships that result in the creation of both rental and home ownership opportunities that enable the year-round workforce to live in MDI's four communities.

As an organization, IHT creates affordable housing opportunities for applicants who meet our eligibility criteria. Finally, we work with other public and private partners to ensure that workforce housing on MDI remains affordable into the future.



Ripples 3: Expanding Affordable Year-Round Housing on MDI

Island Housing Trust is excited to announce Ripples 3, the final phase of the Ripples Hill neighborhood in the Town of Mount Desert. This project will add 9 new homes for Mount Desert Island's year-round workforce, providing much-needed stability for families who live and work in our community.

With two successful phases already completed, Ripples 3 represents the next step in our mission to create sustainable, permanently affordable housing solutions. These homes will be energy-efficient, built to last, and designed to strengthen our island's year-round community.



IHT HISTORY

Island Housing Trust was founded in 1989 as the Mount Desert Development Trust, based in the Town of Mount Desert. Later renamed the Mount Desert Community Trust, the organization completed one workforce housing project in 1994 through a 99-year lease on a town-owned piece of land off Route 198 in Mount Desert, and then was inactive for a number of years. In 2003, following the second MDI Tomorrow initiative, the Mount Desert Community Trust's Board of Directors was reconstituted and the organization's mission expanded to include all four towns on MDI. In 2005, the organization's name was changed to Island Housing Trust to reflect that expanded mission.

Since 2003, Island Housing Trust has completed 46 homeownership projects serving 150 adults and children on Mount Desert Island.

Among the projects are:

- 9 energy-efficient houses at IHT's Ripples Hill neighborhood in Somesville; Phase 3 is in planning and will add 10 more houses;
- 17 Homeownership Assistance Program (HOAP) projects in which IHT provided bridge funding that enabled qualified applicants to purchase year-round houses on MDI.
- 4 houses in the Sabah Woods neighborhood in the Thomas Bay area of Bar Harbor.
- A donated 2.4 acre parcel of land in Somesville that became the site of a single-family residence.
- An anonymously donated house, moved onto land donated by the Town of Mount Desert, on Beech Hill Road.
- 3 partnership projects with Maine Coast Heritage Trust, that to date have provided seven year-round homes in Bar Harbor, with four more homes coming in 2023, and the potential for up to three more homes in the future.
- IHT holds covenants on 44 homes, and has overseen the successful re-sale of several of these properties, all carrying IHT's affordability covenants and thus resold at below-market-rate to qualified households working on MDI.

IHT How to Apply

Review IHT's Eligibility Criteria and Affordability Covenants. If you believe you are eligible for IHT's programs:

Go to the financial institution of your choice and obtain a certificate of pre-qualification. (This is a form from the bank addressed to you that states you are qualified to obtain a mortgage loan of up to a certain amount, for example, \$200,000.)

You can apply securely online: Fill out the application (link below), attach income verification (two recent pay stubs and most recent federal tax return), and pre-qualification information; OR You can mail your completed application and the certificate of pre-qualification to Island Housing Trust, P.O. Box 851, Mount Desert, ME 04660 or submit it in person at our office at 1366 State Highway 102, 2nd Floor (Pineo Building), Town Hill.

Your completed application will be reviewed by IHT's Executive Director, who will make a formal prequalification determination of which you will be notified in writing, by post or email. An application is not considered complete until the attachments and certificate of pre-qualification
